The RHS girls varsity basketball team accomplished so much and achieved a great deal during the 2021 season, a season full of hoops to run through, hurdles to jump, mountains to climb and obstacles to clear.

After a couple of wins in the first and second rounds of the state 2-A tournament, the Tigers found themselves up against Farmville Central, which has experienced more success over the past few seasons than any other team in the state. The Jaguars advanced to the state championship in 2019, falling to Mountain Heritage for the title. Farmville Central advanced to the state championship game once again in 2020, only to have the title game cancelled due to the virus that was sweeping the nation.

The Jaguars rolled through the abbreviated 2021 regular season and then earned easy playoff victories over Kinston (72-24) and North Pitt (78-57). FCHS entered Saturday's game against the Tigers with a perfect 12-0 mark, impressive by itself. But look a little deeper and the Jaguars were not only unbeaten, they averaged 73.9 points per game while allowing just 28.8, an average winning margin of 45.1 points per game. Amazing.

And that level of talent was seen early on Saturday as the Jaguars' pressure defense, height, strength and quickness allowed them to jump into an early lead against the Tigers.

This was going to get ugly. But Randleman wouldn't allow that to happen.

With about 30 seconds to go in the first half, Randleman had pulled to within five points of the Jaguars. Farmville Central scored the final two buckets of the first half for a nine-point halftime lead and then started the second half with a big run to assume control.

But the Tiger kept scratching and clawing, forcing the Jaguars to call a pair of timeouts in the second half, something I guess they hadn't had to do very much, if at all, this entire season. With Elizabeth York, Gracyn Hall, Veronica Marlow, Hannah Hinshaw and Audra Petty leading the way, the Tigers pulled to within 13 in the final quarter.

If this was a fairy book story, the Tigers would have somehow found a way to post a "David defeats Goliath" victory. They didn't and the Jaguars went on to complete a 71-54 victory.

Disappointing for the Tigers? Sure.

But the Jaguars knew they were in a battle. It wasn't easy for them and that's because the Tigers continued to battle with everything they had until the final buzzer sounded. The Jaguars scored more points and they certainly recorded more rebounds, but they didn't outplay the Tigers, they didn't show more heart and they certainly didn't show more determination.
