RANDLEMAN - As a three-year performer for the Randleman High School varsity football team, senior Harrison Moffitt has known nothing other than ending the regular season as a member of the Piedmont Athletic Conference championship team.

This one, however, may be just a little more special.

Moffitt and the Tigers wrapped up another league title with a 17-0 win over Eastern Randolph this past week. It was the fourth straight league title for the Tigers and third for Moffitt. In the first two, Moffitt was a key contributor on defense as well as splitting quarterback duties last season. This year, Moffitt was the starting quarterback, played his usual key role on defense and celebrated his senior season with another championship.

"It definitely is, especially being my senior year," Moffitt said about wrapping up the title after the Tigers improved to 6-0 with their 36th straight regular-season victory. "I feel like this is my team, I'm a leader and everyone looks up to me. I was a bigger part of the championship this year."

That's putting things mildly.

Unlike in previous seasons when the Tigers used a more balanced attack offensively, RHS has switched to a mostly running team, with Moffitt the key threat. He has rushed for a team-leading 759 yards and 12 touchdowns, while throwing for 463 yards and five more scores.

"The one thing that everyone should know about Harrison Moffitt is that he is an absolute leader," first-year head coach Shane Timmons said. "Whatever it takes. A lot of quarterbacks would be upset if they only threw eight passes a game, but there is not a shred of vanity. He's just as happy handing the ball off. From kickoff to the final buzzer, he is 100 percent positive."

Moffitt did get plenty of action at the quarterback position as a junior, splitting time with Coby Price. When Price transferred, Moffitt said he had a great opportunity to lead the Tigers. Although he was one of the leaders on defense from his linebacking position, he now could put a larger footprint on the RHS offense. And the RHS coaching staff allowed Moffitt to start at both quarterback and linebacker, something not often seen in high school football.

"I knew last year after Coby left, I had to work hard over the summer," Moffitt said. "I dropped 30 pounds, from 220 to 190. The college coaches I have talked to said they have never seen someone play linebacker and quarterback. I just love to hit."

Moffitt has registered 35 tackles this year, second on the team.

"It goes back to all the hard work and conditioning we have done," Moffitt said. "They do get me out of there on special teams so I can get a breather."

Moffitt said he doesn't mind leading a run-heavy offense.

"Our offensive line, those guys are mean and we know what they can do," Moffitt said. "Even when I drop back, I can take off and scramble."

Timmons said Moffitt has shown a great deal of leadership and maturity along with his talent.

"I will be driving home from practice and I will get a phone call and he'll start talking about whatever thoughts he has," Timmons said. "He's a great leader."

That has been proven once again.
